

Health and Safety Amendments to Criminal Code Raises Accountability in Canadian Boardrooms and Workplaces

March 31, 2004 - Bill C-45, an Act to Amend the Criminal Code (criminal liability of organizations) comes into force today. The CSSE - Canada's Safety, Health and Environmental Practitioners applauds changes to the Criminal Code of Canada that will:

- make it easier for the courts to convict organizations for wanton and reckless disregard of workplace safety;
- establish a legal duty for all persons directing work to take reasonable steps to ensure the safety of workers and the public;
- increase the financial and personal penalties to those convicted of criminal negligence; and
- provide new probationary options to be imposed on convicted organizations

The bar of accountability has been raised for organizations across Canada. We encourage Workplace Leaders to take steps to anticipate, identify, assess and control health and safety hazards and risks that cause untold human and organizational suffering and loss. The best way to manage liability is to proactively prevent injury, illness and loss from occurring in the first place.
