

It is a pleasure to write to you on my first anniversary as governor general. My wife, Sharon, and I have been thrilled to travel the full breadth of this country, to rediscover its beauty and its vibrant promise. We have always been fiercely proud of our country, and this past year has offered us a glimpse into the heart and soul of Canada: its people.

As a people, we are both caring and giving, qualities that are intrinsic to us and which are amplified by circumstances of a country with vast distances, harsh climates and a long history of families and communities coming together. We have seen the ingenuity of Canadians in research and innovation, and are encouraged by the imagination at work in our big cities and in the far-flung corners of our land. And everywhere we have travelled, we have met members of the Order of Canada who



have deeply impressed us with their commitment, and who continue to make extraordinary contributions to the building of our nation.

In August, Sharon and I were in the tiny arctic community of Resolute Bay, visiting the military's Operation Nanook, when, tragically, a commercial airplane crashed a kilometre or so away as it was attempting to land. Twelve of the 15 people aboard perished, leaving families and loved ones devastated. The response of the military, of civilian institutions and of local residents was truly heroic. And as we encouraged rescue workers and comforted community members, we bore witness to the professionalism of our men and women in uniform, and the caring and resiliency of our communities.

When I last spoke to you through this bulletin, I invited you, as members of the Order of Canada, to persevere in building a smarter and more caring nation. As recipients of the highest civilian honour our country bestows, you exemplify Canada's core values. I encourage you to continue serving as role models, and through your actions—like those demonstrated in Resolute Bay—to respond to the call to serve with the talent and commitment that you have demonstrated in so many extraordinary ways.

As I begin the second year of my mandate, I urge all Canadians to work towards a smarter and more caring society, and to give creative thought to how we might best achieve this goal. I believe the members of the Order of Canada have a special role to play, and I invite you to join me as we reflect on making our great country greater.

World-renowned as an operatic bass, he has also contributed greatly to the flourishing classical music scene in Quebec.

On June 30, Canada Post unveiled the fourth stamp in the third set of its Canadian Recording Artists series, this one featuring singer-songwriter Robbie Robertson. Mr. Robertson was appointed an Officer of the Order of Canada in 2007. His long list of accolades includes, among others, the Governor General's Award for Lifetime Artistic Achievement; numerous Juno Awards; honorary doctorates from York and Queen's universities; and his induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.



The first stamp to celebrate a living Canadian music icon was released in 2005, to mark the 80th birthday of international jazz great Oscar Peterson (1925 - 2007), a Companion of the Order. In 2007, the Canadian Recording Artists series was launched with a set of four stamps featuring Joni Mitchell, Paul Anka, Anne Murray and Gordon Lightfoot. The second set, released in 2009, included Bryan Adams, Stompin' Tom Connors, Robert Charlebois and Edith Butler.

The Robertson stamp completes the third set, which also features Ginette Reno, Bruce Cockburn, Anna McGarrigle and the late Kate McGarrigle. The Order of Canada insignia is displayed on each stamp.

The Man in Motion World Tour was the beginning of a lifelong journey to make a positive difference in the lives of others. This year, to mark its 25th anniversary, the Rick Hansen Anniversary Relay will re-trace the Canadian segment of the tour, beginning in Cape Spear, Newfoundland and Labrador, and concluding in Vancouver. Over 600 communities in every province and territory will be visited by more than 7 000 volunteers who are making a difference in the lives of others. To mark the occasion, the Royal Canadian Mint (<u>www.mint.ca</u>) has created an inspiring medallion as a keepsake of the anniversary and historic relay. The Mint also announced that proceeds from the sale of each medallion will be donated to the Rick Hansen Foundation.

The Foundation, of which the Governor General is patron, has raised more than \$250 million to accelerate progress towards a cure for spinal cord injury and towards a more accessible and inclusive world.

Ms. Gardiner was appointed on November 4, 2009. She was recognized for her enduring contributions as an executive and as a volunteer in the business and community sectors of Newfoundland and Labrador over the past 50 years.

Among her numerous accomplishments, she established the theatre department at the National Arts Centre and introduced a playwright-in-residence program.

IN MEMORIAM

Rideau Hall lost a friend with the passing of Algonquin Elder William Commanda, O.C. From 1951 to 1970, Elder Commanda was the band chief of the Kitigàn-zìbì Anishinàbeg First Nation, near Maniwaki, Quebec, 130 kilometres (81 mi) north of Ottawa. The respected Elder and leader worked as a guide, trapper and woodsman, and as a birchbark canoe maker and craftsman. Elder Commanda was also the official keeper of three sacred wampum belts. He became an Officer of the Order of Canada in 2008.

As Rideau Hall, the official residence of the governor general, is located on Algonquin territory, Elder Commanda was often invited to be a key part of ceremonies and celebrations held there. His prayers, gestures and words were an inspiration to all those present. He will be missed.
