On the road since late July 2013, the travelling exhibit *It's An Honour!* has been connecting, honouring and inspiring Canadians across our country.

Officially launched by the Governor General on September 16, 2013, at Henry Wise Wood Senior High School, in Calgary, Alberta, the exhibit has met with success in its first months on tour. The specially designed vehicle visited 3 provinces, 2 territories and 25 communities, totalling 19 255 visitors.

Staff members travelling with the exhibit have heard some remarkable stories. Gordon Lee, a Second World War veteran from Rocky Mountain House, Alberta, visited and talked about his friendship with Victoria Cross recipient Ernest Alvia "Smokey" Smith. In Cranbrook, British Columbia, staff had the pleasure of meeting Louise Stropky, a Caring Canadian Award recipient, who has spent numerous years volunteering as a caregiver for the elderly; they also met Garry Anderson, appointed Member of the Order of Canada for his work promoting our national railway heritage.

Throughout this past summer and fall, the exhibit has travelled to six fairs and festivals, and hosted students from 26 schools, including junior high, high school and even a few elementary classes. On Remembrance Day, the exhibit was attended by visitors from Sylvan Lake, Alberta, including veterans, members of the Canadian Armed Forces, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the Sylvan Lake Royal Canadian Legion, firefighters and peace officers, many of whom were in uniform and proudly told stories of their honours.

After three months in Alberta, the exhibit made its way into British Columbia at the end of November 2013, where it will stay until March 2014. It will then begin to make its way east, visiting the Prairies and arriving in Ontario at the beginning of the summer. The exhibit will visit the Maritimes in the summer and Quebec in the fall of 2014. Order of Canada members will be contacted with an invitation to attend the exhibit when it rolls through their respective hometowns.

- The stone arch alludes to Mr. Eppich's home in West Vancouver. 'Ivy' is the translation of the Middle High German word 'Eppich'.
- The concentric circles recall the ripple effect of a stone entering water, a metaphor for his positive influence on his family, community and business.
- The triangle evokes the mountains of Greater Vancouver, his adopted home, and the mountains of Slovenia, his birthplace.
- The red annulus, inscribed with the motto of the Order of Canada, and the suspended Order of Canada insignia indicate that Mr. Eppich is a member of the Order.

Mr. Eppich's eldest son Robert uses his father's arms with a difference. His other descendants will do the same.

They are also created for institutions of all kinds for identification and promotion. Unlike most logos, they are grounded in history.

- The Chinese phoenix is a sign of peace and prosperity.
- The panda and the polar bear allude to the Wongs' Chinese and Canadian heritage.
- Red and white are the colours of Canada.
- The open scrolls represent the contribution that the Wongs have made to Canadian society.
- The pick axe and the hammer recall the family history in the gold fields and in the construction of the Canadian Pacific railway.

STATE VISITS TO THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA AND TO MONGOLIA

From October 16 to 26, 2013, Their Excellencies conducted State visits to the People's Republic of China and to Mongolia, to highlight Canada's bilateral relations with both countries.

Their Excellencies were joined by parliamentarians and an accompanying delegation of Canadians who greatly contributed to furthering partnerships Canada has developed with China and Mongolia, particularly in such areas as trade, innovation, prosperity, education and culture. The Honourable John Manley, O.C., and Gilles G. Patry, C.M., were among the members of this accomplished delegation.

The visit to China coincided with several other high-profile Canadian events, including the 35th Annual General Meeting and Policy Conference of the Canada Chinese Business Council, as well as a performance and education tour by the National Arts Centre Orchestra and its music director, Pinchas Zukerman. Their Excellencies and the delegation travelled to Beijing, Shanghai, Nanjing, Chengdu and Guangzhou—a cross-section of cities that complemented the broad objectives of the visit.

The visit to Mongolia came at an opportune time, as this year marks 40 years of diplomatic relations between both countries. As the first Canadian governor general to visit Mongolia, His Excellency delivered an address before the State Great Khural to acknowledge this important milestone in the evolving and strengthening relationship between Canada and Mongolia.

Beechwood is run through the not-for-profit Beechwood Cemetery Foundation, which counts several members of the Order of Canada among its directors, and was designated the National Cemetery of Canada by Parliament, in 2009.
