1 teleconference / téléconférence --- Upon commencing on Tuesday, June 11, 2013 2 at 3:01 p.m. / La conférence débute le mardi 3 11 juin 2013 à 15 h 01 4 OPERATOR: All participants, 5 please stand by. Your conference is ready to 6 begin. 7 Good afternoon ladies and 8 9 gentlemen. Welcome to the pre-hearing conference as part of the public hearing proceedings to 10 establish a Red Raspberry Research, Market 11 Development and Promotion Agency. 12 I would now like to turn the 13 meeting over Mr. Tim O'Connor, Panel Chair. 14 Please go ahead, Mr. O'Connor. 15 16 THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. Good afternoon ladies and 17 gentlemen. 18 My name is Tim O'Connor and I am 19 20 the Panel Chair. I am a joined today with our 21 newly-appointed Council Member, Mike Pickard, from Saskatchewan. Mike has replaced 22 Phil Klassen, whose term with the FPCC ended in 23 mid-March. 24 Joining us again is Duane 25

1 Schippers, our legal counsel and Nathalie Vanasse, Hearing Secretary, who are here to 2 3 answer your questions regarding rules and the process for the hearing. 4 Before we begin, please note that 5 the transcript of this teleconference will be 6 produced and posted on FPCC's Web site. 7 The Council appointed this Panel 8 to conduct hearings into the merits of 9 establishing a Red Raspberry Research, Market 10 Development and Promotion Agency. 11 As part of its duties, the 12 Council must inquire into the merits of 13 establishing an agency for any farm product where 14 producer groups file such a request, and then 15 16 proceed to make recommendations to the Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food in accordance to the 17 Farm Products Agencies Act. 18 In connection with such 19 inquiries, Section 8 of the Act directs Council 20 21 to hold public hearings. While doing so, it has all of the powers of a Commissioner appointed 22 under Part I of the Inquiries Act. 23 During this inquiry, the merits 24 of a proposal developed by the British Columbia 25

Red Raspberry Industry Development Council will
be examined. The proposal pertains to the
establishment of a Red Raspberry Research, Market
Development and Promotion Agency under Part III
of the FPAA.

6 The notice was published in the 7 Canada Gazette on January 19, 2013 as required 8 under Section 9 of the Act. The notice gave the 9 purpose and scope of the hearing. Council's 10 inquiry was also advertised in weekly newspapers 11 and farm journals across Canada.

12 The Council extended submissions 13 on the proposal for the Raspberry agency to 14 April 30, 2013. We have received a total of 26 15 submissions and 3 requests to appear.

The Act stipulates that, in making recommendations to the Minister, Council will not propose the establishment of an agency unless it is satisfied that a majority of producers and importers are in favour of such action.

In the proposal submitted by the Raspberry Industry Development Council, as well as the submissions received following the April 30th extension, the Panel is satisfied with the demonstrated support and therefore decided to
proceed with next steps.

As a panel, we want to encourage participation at the hearings and, depending on our agenda at each hearing, we hope to hear from the floor.

Any person or party who has filed 7 a Request to Appear will be given the right to 8 cross-examine other interveners at the hearing. 9 Second priority will be given to anyone who has 10 filed a submission with the Panel within the 11 prescribed deadline. Although they will not be 12 allowed to cross-examine other interveners, the 13 Panel does recognize them as participants in the 14 15 hearing.

16 The last part of the agenda will 17 be reserved, time permitting, to hear from anyone 18 who wishes to make their views known.

We intend to be an active Panel and ask a lot of questions. We are going to look at this proposal from all sides, both in support and against, and to examine any constructive suggestions for change to the proposal as it has been put forward by the British Columbia Raspberry Industry Development Council.

1 The Panel intends to be fair throughout the process hearing. We want to be 2 3 fair to all individuals and groups appearing before us, and we intend to ensure that each 4 group will be given an equal chance to speak and 5 to ask questions; we hope to be as flexible as 6 possible during these hearings 7 We also want to be sure that we 8 9 have carried out our mandate as fairly as possible, to allow us to submit a well-balanced 10 report, having considered every element brought 11 forward. 12 In terms of the outcome of the 13 process, the Panel will prepare a report for 14 Council which will contain recommendations. 15 In 16 these, the Panel could support the proposal, in whole or part, recommend that certain powers 17 under Section 42 of the Act be included or 18 excluded and, alternatively, the Panel could 19 20 offer some of the changes that may be proposed 21 during the hearings. This is perhaps the most 22 important part of this process. Public hearings 23 are conducted to get input from people from all 24 sectors of the industry and to use this in 25

1 preparing our recommendations.

Once the hearings are concluded, 2 3 the Panel will make its suggestions to Farm Products Council of Canada. Council will then 4 prepare a report with recommendations to the 5 Minister of Agriculture. 6 It is then up to the Minister to 7 decide whether or not to proceed with the 8 Proclamation of the Agency. I want to emphasize 9 that the Panel does not make the decision in 10 terms of whether or not there is to be an agency. 11 The purpose of this meeting is to 12 discuss the dates and locations of the hearings 13 themselves, and to settle the other procedural 14 matters listed on the agenda. 15 All decisions on these matters 16 will be published in a report which will be sent 17 to all participants. The dates and the locations 18 of the hearings will be advertised on FPCC's Web 19 20 site as soon as possible. 21 The public examination file that contains all of the submissions and letters of 2.2 opinion received is also on our Web site for 23 public view, as it will be at all hearing 24

sessions. Another set is kept at the Council

1 office.

Evidence tabled during the 2 3 hearings will be added to the public file as we go, including the transcripts of the hearings. 4 Ladies and gentlemen, this 5 concludes my opening remarks and we will now 6 proceed with the agenda for today. 7 Thank you. 8 9 MS VANASSE: Thank you, Mr. Chair, and hello everyone. 10 11 The General Rules of Procedure govern the hearings conducted by the Council to 12 provide a framework to the process in a uniform 13 and expeditious manner, while maintaining 14 safeguards to ensure fairness throughout the 15 16 proceedings. From these rules, guidelines were 17 developed to outline the procedures for the 18 public hearing to be conducted by the Panel 19 appointed to review the British Columbia 20 21 Raspberry Industry Development Council's proposal. 22 23 The objectives of the public hearings are to provide opportunities for the 24 Applicant to explain the proposal and respond to 25

1 concerns and questions raised by interveners during the hearing. 2 3 It also provides a forum for stakeholder groups, Government representatives, 4 and the public, to provide their views on the 5 implications of the proposal. 6 In addition to these procedures, 7 the Panel, under Section 25 of the Rules, has the 8 9 power to summon persons to appear as witnesses and provide evidence before the Panel. 10 The information presented to the 11 Panel will help them complete its assessment of 12 the merits and effects of the proposal. 13 The procedures are meant to 14 ensure that the public hearings take place in a 15 16 fair and equitable manner, with maximum co-operation and courtesy. The Chair of the 17 Panel will maintain order and efficiency of the 18 19 proceedings. In accordance with Section 10 of 20 21 the Farm Products Agencies Act, the Panel will conduct the public hearings in a manner that 22 ensures a thorough examination of relevant 23 matters, and encourages public input and 24 participation. 25

1 As mentioned by the Chair, 26 submissions were received by the April 30, 2013 2 deadline. 3 All submissions have been placed 4 on the public record and made available for 5 viewing. Interveners who wish to have a copy of 6 the application and any submissions may do so by 7 accessing FPCC's internet site. 8 The submission period is now 9 However, any additional request could be 10 closed. considered by the Panel Chair. If an intervener 11 requests that information be kept confidential, 12 the Panel will deliberate and decide whether the 13 information can be protected. 14 15 To ensure that the hearings are 16 held in a manner that offers all parties an effective opportunity to participate, the Panel 17 will hold two hearings, one in Abbotsford, 18 British Columbia in mid-October and one in Ottawa 19 around mid-November. Further details will be 20 21 posted on FPCC's Web site as they become available. 22 To date, we have received 3 23 requests to appear. Interveners who filed a 24 request to appear will be granted a time, either 25

1 in Ottawa or in Abbotsford, depending on the origin of their request. If any change is 2 3 required, do not hesitate to contact me. Interveners are invited to make 4 their presentation in the official language of 5 their choosing, as interpretation services will 6 be available. 7 Interveners who will make an oral 8 statement at the hearings will have their views 9 officially entered into the record of the 10 proceedings through the official transcripts. 11

All new documents or information referred to during the presentation must be submitted to the Hearing Secretary within ten working days ahead of the Public Hearing.

Participants making presentations at the hearing session may be asked questions by the Panel, the Applicant and other interveners. Questioning will allow the Panel and all participants to gather information and explore issues related to the potential effects of the proposal.

All participants should be
courteous and respectful when asking questions.
The Panel Chair may refuse to permit further

1 questioning from an individual who is being discourteous or disrespectful; clarity and 2 3 brevity are encouraged. The Panel Chair may limit or 4 exclude questions or comments that fall outside 5 the mandate of the Panel or the scope of the 6 hearings, are repetitive, irrelevant, or 7 immaterial. The Panel may also limit questions 8 if it feels it has sufficient information on a 9 specific topic. 10 11 The Panel Chair may also limit the number of questions in order to respect the 12 time schedule for each session. If a participant 13 would like additional time during the question 14 period to ask detailed questions, advance 15 16 notification should be provided to the Panel. Additional questions to any or 17 all parties may be communicated to the Panel in 18 writing. The questions will be forwarded to all 19 20 parties for information sharing purposes, and the 21 appropriate party will respond, in writing, via the Panel, whom will distribute the response. 22 This can be done via FPCC's Web 23 site, by e-mail to the Hearing Secretary or by 24 postal mail. 25

1 Interveners who have not yet registered still have the opportunity to address 2 3 the Panel. Registration may be made until the day of the hearing sessions. 4 The opportunity for persons who 5 have not previously registered to make a 6 presentation may be granted at the discretion of 7 the Panel Chair. Priority will be given to 8 9 Interveners who have registered in advance. As mentioned earlier, the public 10 examination file that contains all of the 11 submissions and letters of opinion received is 12 available on our Web site, as it will also be 13 available during all hearing sessions. Evidence 14 tabled during the hearings will be added to the 15 16 public file as we go, including the transcripts of the hearings. 17 In addition, the transcript of 18 this pre-hearing conference will be available 19 20 within the next few days. 21 That concludes my presentation Mr. Chair, if you agree we can now open the floor 22 to questions. 23 24 Thank you. Yes, we'll turn 25 THE CHAIRPERSON:

1 it over to the moderator. OPERATOR: Thank you. 2 Please press "*1" at this time if 3 you have a question. 4 There will be a brief pause while 5 the participants register for questions. Thank 6 you for your patience. 7 --- Pause 8 9 OPERATOR: Once again, please press "*1" at this time if you have a question. 10 11 Our first question is from Sharmin Gamiet. Please go ahead. 12 MS GAMIET: For somebody to say 13 something at the sittings, must they be a 14 Canadian citizen? 15 16 Can they be a foreign --17 MS VANASSE: They can be foreign. It doesn't have to be a Canadian intervener. 18 19 MS GAMIET: Okay. 20 OPERATOR: Thank you. 21 There are no further questions registered at this time. I would like to turn 22 your meeting back over to Mr. O'Connor. 23 THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. 24 Well, this concludes our agenda. 25

1 I now have a few closing remarks. First of all, I appreciate your 2 3 presence here today and I would like to thank, on behalf of the Panel, the participants on this 4 pre-hearing teleconference, and especially the 5 staff that have worked so diligently during this 6 7 process. The Panel is looking forward to 8 9 the hearing. As I previously mentioned, we intend on being an active Panel and to ask a lot 10 of questions. We encourage participation from 11 all individuals and groups appearing before us, 12 and expect fair, constructive and thorough 13 discussions during these proceedings. 14 Thank you very much for your 15 16 participation. This concludes today's pre-hearing conference. 17 Thank you. 18 OPERATOR: The conference has now ended. 19 Please disconnect your lines at this time, and we thank you for your 20 21 participation. --- Conference adjourned at 3:16 p.m. / 22 La conférence se termine à 15 h 16 23 24 25
