# DYNASTIC STRUGGLES

Theatre folk are not exactly shrinking violets, so maybe it comes as no surprise that Theatre Calgary, which is about to launch its 50th anniversary season, decided to throw its own birthday party.

The bash begins Sept. 5 when the curtain goes up on Blow Wind High Water. The show is written by Sharon Pollock, "the first woman of Canadian theatre," and deals with three generations of Calgarians struggling to stick together as the flood waters rise. It marks a return of sorts for Pollock, who had one of her earliest successes as a playwright when Walsh premiered at Theatre Calgary in 1973. She also served as the company's artistic director in 1984. In a pleasing bit of symmetry, Blow Wind High Water will mark the first production for Theatre Calgary under its new artistic director, Stafford Arima.

Dynastic succession of a more turbulent nature is the focus of *The Last Wife*, which opens the Alberta Theatre Projects season (Sept. 12-30). A hit at the Stratford Festival in 2015, *The Last Wife* centres on Katherine Parr and her attempts to wield influence over her husband, Henry VIII.

Fans of political intrigue will also want to catch *Julius Caesar* (Sept. 21 to Oct. 7) at The Shakespeare Company. Intrigue of a different nature forms the core of Vertigo Mystery Theatre's *Nine Dragons* (Sept. 16 to Oct. 15), which begins with the murder of a beautiful spy on the seedy side of Hong Kong and then travels to even darker places. —*Bruce Weir*

# **SOLID CITIZENS**

The Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra is both a pillar of the community and a good host. The former status is achieved by lending its talents to organizations like Calgary Opera and Alberta Ballet when they are in need of live music.

This year, that list expands to include the Calgary International Film Festival and its presentation of *La La Land* with a live soundtrack (Sept. 21). As for being a gracious host, the CPO this season welcomes the likes of Jan Lisiecki (Sept. 29 and 30), Kronos Quartet (Oct. 13 and 14), Fred Penner (Oct. 22), Yo-Yo Ma (Dec. 7 and 8) and even figure skater Jamie Salé, who presents *Music of the Ice: Skating's Greatest Hits* (Oct. 20 and 21).

The highlight of the fall may well be *True North: Symphonic Ballet*,

a CPO commission that celebrates the 150th anniversary of Confederation. The work is a collaboration between five Canadian composers and the choreographer Yukichi Hattori.

The Calgary Opera season kicks off with *The Barber of Seville* (Nov. 18, 22 and 24) but its first public event is the *Grand Salute to Bob McPhee*, who is stepping down as general director and CEO after 19 years. The event goes Oct. 3 and features an impressive array of singers, including Tracy Dahl, Andrea Hill, John Tessier and Brett Polegato. All proceeds from the evening will go to Calgary Opera's endowment for new works and emerging artists, which is only fitting given that McPhee championed both during his tenure. —*B.W.*

# HISTORY AT WORK

Medieval tapestries were both decorative and informative. They remain inspirational. Take the Bayeux Tapestry, for instance. The zippy little number was begun around 1070 and, in the course of its 70 metres, tells the tale of the Norman Conquest of England. Sandra Sawatzky is a Calgary-based filmmaker, writer and artist. More importantly, she finds embroidery to be meditative, and, after a quick trip to the library to reacquaint herself with the Bayeux Tapestry, decided to create a tapestry—about 70 metres long—telling the story of how oil has impacted human civilization.

Nine years and some 16,000 hours of stitching later (she was in the habit of getting up at 5:15 a.m. and quitting for the day at 10:15 p.m.), Sawatzky has completed her project. *The Black Gold Tapestry* goes on display at the Glenbow beginning Oct. 7. In a concession to modernity, it has a website, theblackgold-tapestry.com, so those who just can't wait can get a sneak peek.

The Sleeping Green, Dianne Bos's latest series of photographs was similarly inspired by historical events. The Calgary artist travelled to the battlefields of the First World War some 100 years after the guns fell silent. Bos works with pinhole cameras, which require long exposures to capture images. This means her work captures both a place and the passing of time.

It's an effect Bos heightens by incorporating objects found in no man's land—rocks, leaves, a bullet—into her printing process. The technique, yielding as it does images that are both beautiful and eerie, is well-suited to a meditation on no man's land some 100 years after it earned its name.

The Sleeping Green—the exhibition takes its title from a line in Break of Day in the Trenches by the British war poet Isaac Rosenberg—runs Oct. 28 to Nov. 18 at Newzones. Bos will be signing copies of her limited-edition book at the opening. —B.W.
