Message from the Chair of the Board of Directors and the CEO

This past year was one of transition in the senior leadership at the Coaching Association of Canada (CAC). The potential for the future exists because of the dedicated leadership that has served the organization to date, from the late Dr. Geoff Gowan, to more recently John Bales, who helped shape the CAC for many years. It is from their tireless efforts that we will continue to make the organization perform and improve to meet the needs of coaches and the coaching community.

The CAC's direction, under the leadership of Lorraine Lafrenière, is to make coaches better – together.

To understand this direction, it's important to understand some of the past. The Coaching Association of Canada was created in the 1970s, in response to a report by the Task Force on Sport for Canadians, tabled in the House of Commons in 1969, which saw the government create a number of arms-length sport agencies. The CAC's mandate was to provide the coaching support necessary to develop elite athletes.

This mandate was created in the absence of any other agency or education body, including universities and colleges, providing this national service. The landscape has changed much since then. There are now many valuable partners in coach education including other organizations, universities, and colleges. And as the landscape changes so must we – we must shift our thinking from monopoly to collaboration. The fastest way to affect better coaching in Canada is to partner and share in providing coach education. In addition, our thinking around policy must be challenged. Policy must link to the practicality of delivering coach education. This is a more challenging area – but we need to think about how to make things simpler, easier to understand, and how to provide easier access to education – we cannot afford to lose our many potential volunteer coaches because they cannot understand how to gain the knowledge they need to feel confident in being part of our community. In fact, we need to excite them to want to take on the coaching challenge. Our sports, provinces, and territories need the CAC to share in motivating our volunteers to contribute.

We have spent a significant amount of time discussing how we can become more focused on serving the needs of our partners. For instance, how does rolling out new policy affect our partners? How does the timing impact them? How do we explain our information more clearly? How do we remove policies that do not support development? What do we need to do to provide our partners with the right tools to be successful at the provincial/territorial level?

There is so much that can be done to improve support for coaches, however the focus must remain on our mandate in coach education and development. Our goal for the upcoming two years is to complete the NCCP transition, which will require not only focus, but finding creative ways for those sports that may not have the resources to complete sport-specific programs, to get the job done.

This past March also saw Coaches of Canada and the Coaching Association of Canada amalgamating, with Coaches of Canada returning to being the professional coaching department of the CAC. Coaches of Canada has grown since the organization left the CAC in the mid-2000s to provide many important services to Canada's coaches. We will work to further enhance these services with the infrastructure that we have available to us. One recent initiative, with the support of Sport Canada, is to engage in a risk management initiative to protect athletes and coaches. The intent is to propose a model of protecting athletes and coaches within our system, in the absence of a regulatory body for coaching in Canada. This initiative is currently at the data gathering phase and there will be more opportunities to engage in the near future.

The team at the CAC is working through how we can best engage with our partners to continue to challenge ourselves to be better. It's a constant topic of conversation. The goal of the Board of Directors and of staff is to maintain this focus – not just this year – but every month, of every year in our future. We understand that progress is not stagnant, it is constant. We will continue to innovate our services, programs, and processes in order to achieve a greater impact on Canadians from coast to coast.

NATIONAL COACHING CERTIFICATION PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



The Launch of Maintenance of Certification

The National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) continued its evolution as a worldleading coach education program by launching its Professional Development component on January 1, 2014. The Coaching Association of Canada and the NCCP partnership recognize the value of having certified NCCP coaches that are engaged in Professional Development programs which reinforce the values of lifelong learning and sharing amongst the coaching community.

All Certified NCCP coaches are now required to maintain their certified status over a defined period of time by accumulating credits for completion of professional development activities. To date, there are over 235 professional development events delivered by our partners which are being tracked in The Locker. These, along with all of the NCCP multi-sport and sport-specific modules offer many options for coaches to explore and enhance their own development and learning paths.

Finally, maintenance of certification also incorporates the tracking of active coaches. The CAC recognizes the commitment of coaches in Canada and as a result provides the opportunity for NCCP coaches to declare they are actively coaching each calendar year. This provides one credit to NCCP coaches towards their maintenance of certification, and allows the CAC to track the number of active coaches in Canada.

Coach Developer Systems

Coach Developer is the umbrella term used to capture the roles in the NCCP that are directly responsible for the development of coaches, those being: Master Learning Facilitators (MLFs), Advanced Learning Facilitators (ALFs), Learning Facilitators (LFs), Master Evaluators (MEs), Advanced Evaluators (AEs), and Evaluators (Es). The goal of this year was to create a clear and simple framework from which to train, develop, and certify the best coach developer workforce in the world.

This began with replacing the existing LF policy with a new "Coach Developer Policy" applicable to the roles listed above. The policy was developed with an advisory committee of 10 National Sport Organizations (NSOs), 1 Provincial/Territorial Coaching Representative (PTCR), and members from the National MLF Team and was passed by the Board of Directors in February 2014.

This policy provides a clear development pathway for all Coach Developers and includes: Core Training, Content-specific Training, Co-delivery, and Evaluation. Having all coach developers follow this path will provide quality assurance and create ambassadors for the NCCP and the Coaching Association of Canada.

In 2013-2014, 976 Coach Developers were trained and 137 Coach Developers were certified.



NATIONAL COACHING CERTIFICATION PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Advanced Coaching Diploma

105 men and 23 women were enrolled in the Advanced Coaching Diploma across the network of centres and institutes this past year with 23 men, and 13 women graduating.

HP Context

In December 2013, Pierre Trudel from the University of Ottawa and David Hill from the Canadian Sport Institute Pacific, along with Peter Niedre from CanoeKayak Canada, Yves Hamelin from Speed Skating Canada, Dustin Heise from Canada Snowboard, and Andy Van Neutegem from Wheelchair Rugby Canada came together in Victoria to develop the first draft of standards for the High Performance context of the new NCCP.





International Development

Over the past 15 years, the CAC has been very active with its international partners and has also been very pro-active in establishing new relationships with other countries in order to further the development of coaches around the world. This past year, three important additions to the CAC's international partners have been Belgium, France, and Barbados.

Highlights:

ACNOA: The process to establish a major partnership with the majority of the African countries through their Olympic Committees and Olympic Solidarity has been underway over the past year. We are currently working on the final details of the agreement to help formalize a 10-year partnership to allow Canadian NCCP multi-sport modules to be delivered directly in Africa.

Barbados: After brief meetings with their Sport Minister, the CAC confirmed a new partnership with Barbados in the delivery of High Performance Coaching Seminars.

Bahrain: In March 2014, the CAC completed the implementation of the NCCP International Level 3. As in Jordan, we are also currently finalizing a new partnership to implement the NCCP International Level 4 Program in Bahrain.





NATIONAL COACHING CERTIFICATION PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



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Belgium: In 2013, the CAC trained many of the current Belgium coach developers to introduce them to Interactive Learning principles. We are now engaged in helping them review some of their current policies for the overall efficiency of their coach education program.

French Soccer Federation: For the very first time, the CAC has partnered with a foreign National Sport Organization to help them transition parts of their curriculum to a Problem Solving Approach in teaching their coaching courses. They have also purchased NCCP licenses to deliver two Competition – Development multi-sport modules to implement in their current coach pathway.

Jordan: Evaluator and MLF training sessions were completed in September 2013. We are currently finalizing a new partnership to implement the NCCP International Level 4 Program in their country.

Luxembourg: Over the past year, the CAC has completed the full implementation of the Multisport Program as Master Learning Facilitators were trained in Luxembourg. The CAC is now working with some Canadian NSOs to implement sport-specific modules in the Luxembourg Coach Education Program.

Trinidad & Tobago: A short-term partnership proposal was sent to the Government of Trinidad & Tobago to follow up on an introduction meeting held in Trinidad in December 2013. A Locker demonstration was hosted by the CAC in early 2014.


Aboriginal Coaching Modules

The Aboriginal Coaching Modules (ACM) were designed to provide culturally relevant courses for coaches and people working with Aboriginal youth and athletes, and were **delivered 33 times in 2013-2014.**

Participants included 149 men, 183 women, 212 Aboriginals, and 120 non-Aboriginals for a total of 332 coaches.

Coach Developer Training: Seven participants also received ACM LF training, representing the Northwest Territories, Yukon Territory, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Ontario, and Labrador.

Canada Games Aboriginal Apprentice Coach Program: Eight Aboriginal Apprentice coaches were selected by their Provincial Sport Organizations (PSOs) to represent their province/territory in the process leading up to the Prince George Canada Winter Games. One professional development workshop was held this past May in Saskatoon in conjunction with the Coaches Association of Saskatchewan's coaches conference.



Integration of coach.ca & The Locker



The integration of The Locker into coach.ca was completed at the end of July 2013. Coaches are now able to access their transcripts, eLearning, course calendars, and more without leaving the framework of coach.ca. A cleaner and easy to navigate home page and redesigned internal pages on coach.ca were also launched at the same time as this integration with the successful end goal of coaches and partners being able to access the most requested content within one-click of landing on coach.ca.

Initiatives

- New web sections were developed for the Fundamental Movement Skills program, the Making Head Way eLearning series, Get Coaching!, and the Maintenance of Certification initiative to make it easier for coaches to understand the products available and to find the correct information.
- A redesigned and renamed "Inside Coaching" newsletter is sent monthly to over 300,000 subscribers and has, on average, a 20% open rate.

The Links

The Links project helps to create clear and consistent information on how to become a coach (including coach pathways and courses/workshops) on organization websites, thereby decreasing the number of requests for coaching information fielded by NSOs and P/TSOs. This past year, the project continued to evolve with the integration of added website development, focused on enhancing the clarity and consistency of NCCP information available for coaches on NCCP partner websites. This included a new section on how to "Become a coach" and added buttons and text linking to coaching content on coach.ca. The need for greater adoption of the Links tool on provincial/territorial websites has been highlighted as an area for improvement on the part of the NCCP partnership.

Football Canada, Softball Canada, Water Polo Canada, and Gymnastics Canada all had the Links tool with this enhanced web content developed for their websites in 2013-2014. Freestyle Ski had only the Links tool portion of this project built for integration into their website.

The Links tools on all completed sports have received close to 130,000 page views this past year.

Coaches plan magazine



The Coaching Association of Canada and Coaches of Canada joined forces this past year to produce *Coaches plan* magazine – a free publication designed for coaches of all sports, at every level of competition. The magazine is published quarterly and is packed full of ideas to spark coaching creativity, resources to help coaches plan, prepare, and deliver exceptional coaching, profiles on coaches who are making an impact in Canada, and much more.

Several communications and marketing initiatives utilized social media this past year including: Sochi Olympic and Paralympic Games posts recognizing coaching contributions to medal performances, "Change your Game" videos on YouTube featuring top coaches and coach developers, CAC event coverage with photos and posts, and regular posts highlighting current issues, stories, and coaches in the news.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

This past year, the CAC technology team completed planned improvements to The Locker, integration of Maintenance of Certification and Professional Development in The Locker, integration of The Locker into the coach.ca website, a conference registration system used for both Partners Day and the Petro-Canada Sport Leadership sportif conference, an eCommerce gateway, the Sport Data Connector technology which allows external sport databases to "synch" their data with The Locker, as well as the development of VIP reports which clearly detail NCCP delivery over a span of time. Phase 1 work related to integrating a targeted mass email tool with The Locker was also initiated.

PROGRAMS

Women in Coaching

GRANTS

Ten National Coaching Institute scholarship grants were provided to female coaches from nine different sports in 2013-14 to assist with tuition for the completion of their Advanced Coaching Diploma.

National Team Apprenticeship Program (NTAP)

The CAC worked with the sports of women's hockey, wrestling, and soccer to engage selected coaches into an apprenticeship program for 2014-16.

A special initiative was hosted with Hockey Canada



Canada Games Apprenticeship Program

The CAC hosted two professional development workshops for 19 selected apprentice coaches from 13 sports to develop their coaching skills and assist them with preparation for the 2013 Canada Summer Games in Sherbrooke, QC. The second of these workshops was delivered in Banff, in December 2013 that invited coaches from three different sports (volleyball, rugby, and speed skating) to attend practices, meetings with integrated support staff, and to watch the 2014 Women's Olympic hockey team's Olympic simulation game in Calgary.

AB in April 2013 in conjunction with the Alberta Sport Conference and World CS4L Summit.

The CAC, in partnership with the Canadian Association for the Advancement of Women and Sport and Physical Activity (CAAWS), also hosted a Women in Coaching reception at the 2013 Canada Games to recognize all the women coaches who attended the Games.

Canadian Journal for Women in Coaching

Four issues were published in 2013-14 and were integrated into *Coaches plan* magazine in order to reach a larger audience.

National Coach Workshop

The National Coach Workshop was held at the Lord Elgin Hotel in Ottawa, ON from March 28-30, 2014 and over 23 female Junior and Senior National and Olympic coaches attended representing 16 different sports.

Coaching Research

Core Funded NCCP Quality Assurance

Our core Support to Sport funding also contributed to a study on Trained-to-Certified coach conversion rates in partnership with Ringette Canada and the Canadian Lacrosse Association, which was presented at Partners Day. Additionally, the CAC partnered with Hockey Canada, Soccer Canada, and Baseball Canada on a research initiative entitled, "Effectively delivering coaching education by Learning Facilitators".

Research Symposium 2013

Through the Research Symposium at the Petro-Canada Sport Leadership sportif conference in Calgary, 20 unique academic research projects dedicated to coaching were presented in oral and poster format by a range of researchers from across the country.

Air Aware eLearning Module

The Air Aware eLearning Module, produced in partnership with Clean Air Champions, was launched January 29, 2014, and has been accessed 310 times since launch.



The Air Aware Coach Module was peer-reviewed by top medical, healthcare, coaching, and air quality science experts from across Canada. It is designed to cover the fundamental issues related to air quality, respiratory health, and allergy for any level of coaching, as well as for healthcare workers, physical education teachers, respirologists, nurses, parks and recreation staff, and anyone involved with physical activity programs.





SPONSPORSHIP AND EVENTS

The CAC continued to benefit from the support of its two key corporate partners: Petro-Canada and Investors Group. Through their continued generous support, the CAC is able to recognize and celebrate Canadian coaches and coach developers, and to support their coach education.

Petro-Canada Sport Leadership sportif 2013

The 2013 Petro-Canada Sport Leadership sportif conference was hosted in Calgary, Alberta at the Westin Calgary from November 7-9. More than 400 delegates attended the event, representing all levels of sport. The conference was themed around creating a positive team culture and benefited from an emotional keynote speech by Elizabeth Manley with a surprise Skype visit from hockey coach Dave King, who played such a pivotal role in her silver medal performance at the 1988 Olympic Winter Games in Calgary. The conference also saw the debut of national team coach panels that featured: Carla Nicholls (Athletics Canada), Danièle Sauvageau (Hockey Canada), Shawnee Harle (Canada Basketball), John Herdman (Soccer Canada), Frank Dick (Athletics), Justin Wadsworth (Cross Country Canada), and Marcel Lacroix (Speed Skating Canada).

As a service to the partnership, 28 partner meetings were hosted by the CAC including board meetings, annual general meetings, and committee sessions. In addition to the reduced rates and logistical support provided by the CAC, the 522 participants also benefited from the attendance of these individuals and organizations.
